GUEST SPEAKER: Kelly Fox



Kelly is one of two Managing Directors of The Traffic Fox Ltd, and administrator of the Facebook Group "Traffic Updates – Horowhenua Kapiti Wellington."

Kelly was born and raised in Otaki, and lived the first 18 years of her life on State Highway 1, where she witnessed many accidents over the years. Kelly saw the need for consolidated traffic information for the regions, especially when the roads were so busy around Christmas time and other holidays.

One small idea for a temporary Facebook page has now turned into a business and full-time job for her – driven by her passion to help the community.

After Kelly left college she trained in radio, because she was always being told she talked too much. Armed with her diploma in radio broadcasting, she then worked in radio advertising and various other radio positions for 16 years. She learnt how to network, and to get brief fact-based information out quickly.

Over this time, she built a network of contacts around the district, which helped with her new venture on Facebook where she has gained a huge following because of her regular and reliable road updates.

The day after Kelly's talk at REBUS there was a large slip on Onslow Road, necessitating a road closure – and this was immediately reported on Kelly's Traffic Updates Facebook page.

Kelly opened her Facebook page on 28 December 2018, and 200 people joined on the first day.

A week later there were 1,000 people and today there are nearly 94,000 members – "of whom 24,000 are very active and vocal" Kelly said. But she stressed that she is just a citizen. "If people give me the information, I'll work out what you need to know." Her knowledge of local territory and local people is her big advantage – and she's actively using it for traffic updates from 5am to 7pm every day, via her cell phone.

The connections work for more than just traffic: Kelly has reunited a lot of people with their lost or stolen cars, with lost cats, lost dogs; and also helped to find missing persons.

SHORT TALK given by Helen Kennard

Helen was born in 1956 in Burwood Hospital, a small full-term baby weighing just under 5 lb. Baby Helen and her mother spent three weeks at the Karitane Hospital.

Home was in Burwood, then a new and rapidly growing suburb (on the outskirts of Christchurch) with houses being built on sandy ground. But life for Helen's family was turned upside down one Queen's Birthday weekend, by her 39 year old mother's death from coronary heart disease. Helen was 5 years old, her brother Phil 11 and sister Margaret 9. After a few months Helen was taken into an aunt's home in Hector, near Granity – north of Westport on the West Coast. Her brother and sister remained with their father in Christchurch, over 200 miles away.



It was three years before Helen returned to her family in Christchurch, and restarted her life with Brownies, Guides, hockey, netball, Avonside Girls' High School; and then Canterbury University and a BCom in accountancy.

After one year working in the Department of Trade & Industry in Christchurch, Helen moved to Wellington, working in many different areas of T&I, usually for two year terms – but on old archaic policies all later abolished in the 1980's. She moved from Price Control to Industries and Import Licensing, to the Pacific Islands Industrial Development Scheme, then to Export Promotion. When T&I was dismembered in 1988, she joined the NZ Trade Development Board – Tradenz. She was in the finance team, and in Auckland for five years when Tradenz moved its head office there. She returned to Wellington when NZ Trade and Enterprise was formed, to its head office. Helen was the only person in the finance office to survive both moves – most of her colleagues were less mobile as they had partners and children to consider.

Helen retired in April 2021 having been made redundant a few months before her 65th birthday. A new CFO from mid 2019 had swept the Finance team clean – bringing in overdue automation, disestablishing most jobs and creating new different jobs requiring different people to fill them. Helen was retained for a period to help with the transition from the old to the new structure.

Helen's hobbies are reading, craft work and genealogy. She is very involved in volunteer work – successively a member of Rotaract, then Jaycees, and Lions since 1997. Helen is on her second stint as treasurer of the Lions Club of Johnsonville, and also co-ordinates the roster for the Lion's BBQ outside Countdown on Johnsonville Road.

Helen's substantial voluntary activities were recognised this year. Just a few days before she spoke to us, Helen was honoured with a 2023 North Wellington Volunteer Service Award.
