FROM THE PRESIDENT

It always gives me much pleasure to induct new members because it indicates that your club is in good heart. That is thanks to enthusiastic members who bring their friends along and to the committee that you have elected for the activities they arrange for you. In my previous notes to you, I indicated that I have mentioned to the Khandallah Bowling Club our concern about the acoustics of our meeting space. For those with a hearing aid, and for those with hearing problems, the noise level can be quite high so that it can be hard to have a conversation during the tea/coffee break. This matter has now been discussed at a meeting of the KBC Board. They advise me that:

We discussed the situation re acoustics in both the main hall area and lounge area. As I have previously outlined the costs of this undertaking are eye wateringly expensive and we concluded given the only periodic use of both areas being impacted by excess noise that our limited funds are better used elsewhere on the building.

As you will no doubt be aware we are a non-profit entity and rely heavily members support both financially and with their time and resources with some limited rental income to maintain both our bowling rink and grounds and building. All in all, we consider that we are fair and good managers of our property managing with limited funds.

We have however recognised that this is something we should not lose sight of and have added acoustics to our long-term maintenance plan to reconsider at another time.

The eye-watering costs that the email refers to, were of the order of \$12,000, just for the lounge area where the KBC has its bar. In our main hall area which we use only once a month, it would be vastly more expensive to improve the acoustics.

So it is clear that you will just have to manage your conversations in such a way that you can understand each other. I won't suggest that you learn to lip-read. You can probably think of much better ways to enjoy a conversation with your friends.

You will have received an updated membership list because all members have renewed their subscriptions. Praise be to you all.

REPORTS JUNE 30th SHORT TALK Murray Major

Murray spoke very concisely about his 30 years as a Telecommunications Engineer with the New Zealand Post Office and later Telecom.

In 1968 after completing a Bachelor of Electrical Engineering degree at the University of Canterbury he joined the Radio Section of the Post Office Engineer in Chief's Office. During five years there he was involved in a wide range of radio planning activities. These included planning the route for many new microwave radio systems, and early site selection work for the satellite earth station, which was subsequently built near Warkworth.



In 1973 Murray moved from Radio to the Telephone Exchange Equipment section, just as exchange equipment technology was changing: first to relay-based crossbar equipment and then some five years later to computer-based SPC equipment. He was mostly involved in the planning for specific new or replacement exchanges using these new technologies. This also included defining the requirements for new telephone exchange buildings and evolving strategies to swap-out equipment within existing buildings to avoid new building work.

Around 1985/86, after a dozen or so years working with telephone exchanges, he moved back to Radio and became involved in the small project team that was investigating the feasibility of introducing a mobile telephone service in New Zealand.

Visits with operators in the UK and Los Angeles, and with Telecom Australia, confirmed that the technology was working and customers wanted these new services. However, it was clear that the usual New Zealand requirement for a highly customized solution would not be possible. A standard system that other markets were using would need to be chosen, together with a supplier with a good reputation.

After calling general tenders Ericsson was selected as supplier, and a small demonstration network was implemented. This evolved to become commercial in August 1987, as the Telecom Cellular part of the new Telecom organization.

Murray continued to be involved in the engineering aspects of the expanding Telecom Cellular network for a further 10 years, until the cellular business was absorbed into the general Telecom organization on April the first 1998.

We enjoyed a very interesting and informative presentation by Susan Guthrie, a Senior Advisor in the Money and Cash Directorate at the Reserve Bank of New Zealand, and Susanna Berry, who is a Senior Policy Analyst in that directorate. FOR THE RECORD

Attendance figures for our June 30th meeting: we welcomed 69 members, and three visitors. We received apologies from 20 members, and noted 20 members were silent.

THEATRE REVIEW *Prima Facie* at Circa Theatre, July 20

Premiered in 2019, Suzie Miller's *Prime Facie* is a disturbing play and a campaigning one. As a defence lawyer, Australian Miller saw that in sexual assault cases, the barriers to justice, partly psychological but mostly legal, produce exactly what a justice system should prevent: injustice. We learn that one in three Australian women experience some form of sexual assault, but convictions are obtained in only 1% of cases. Figures from other countries are similar.

Prime Facie was written not just to expose these facts but to educate an audience as to how this happens. Tessa is a 30ish experienced defence lawyer, artful in undermining prosecution witnesses. We learn that the requirement to prove guilt beyond a reasonable doubt is unrealistically demanding in such cases. Too easily, previous associations and the privacy of the assault permit equivocal accounts to raise doubt, ensuring a not guilty decision.

When Tessa herself is raped, with no room for doubt in the audience's mind, the same high burden of proof in court is lacking and the perpetrator goes free.

In a 1 hour 40 minutes solo bravura performance, Mel Dodge exploits every opportunity that such a story provides. We see Tessa's self-confidence, aggression, triumph, despair and outrage. Besides Tessa, we see, successively, a slack jawed judge, overdue for retirement, her own mother, a none too bright policeman, and various colleagues, all tellingly conveyed with their own mannerisms. Despite what seemed an occasional gabble to my old ears, and probably those of others in our large party, "Brava".

Kudos too to Lyndee-Jane Rutherford's dynamic direction and to the set design team headed by Ian Harman. Multiple level wood grained platforms evoke a courtroom, while facilitating easy changes of scene, according to the requirements of the script. Behind, stands a 20 square metre window in which the panes crack at significant moments, all to be whole again for the next performance. How do they do it?

The international acclaim already received by this play promised us an engrossing but disconcerting evening and a pensive aftermath. And that's what we had.
