# **GUEST SPEAKER**

Alastair Henshaw



Plans to make Wellington the world's first predator free capital city were outlined by guest speaker Alastair Henshaw, the Community Engagement and Field Officer from Predator Free Wellington.

Alastair spoke about making the capital a place where our native species can thrive.

Making Wellington predator free involves the commitment of thousands of households, community groups and organisations, all of whom are working together to remove every single rat, possum, stoat and weasel from the entire Wellington area. It also involves innovative ideas and new technology: for traps and bait stations,

trail cameras and many other monitoring tools, and the essential Apps that make all the data recovery possible.

Phase 1 of the predator eradication project began on the Miramar Peninsula. Norway rats and weasels have been eradicated there and Predator Free Wellington is now chasing down the last remaining ship rats. The outcome has been amazing, Alastair said there has been a 550% increase in piwakawaka, a 275% increase in riroriro, a 100% increase in tree wētā and geckos and skinks have also increased. Previously absent native birds have also returned to the peninsula, including kārearea, kākāriki, kākā, and ruru.

The next phase will cover Island Bay to the CBD. This will be an even bigger challenge.

### **SHORT TALK**

### **Stella Thorp**

Everyone was instantly engaged by Stella's talk when she asked: "Who has flown into Hong Kong? Into the old airport Kai Tak, right in the middle of Kowloon?" Many hands went up – remembering the tall buildings so close on either side you felt you could reach out and touch them.

One July evening in 1968 two-thirds of Stella's family flew into Kai Tak airport. It wasn't Stella's first overseas trip. Her father was a New Zealand diplomat. His first overseas posting was in 1955, to New York. In those days you travelled by ship. But Stella doesn't remember it, not even her second birthday party on that voyage.



By 1968 Stella's older siblings were at university in Wellington. When her father flew in to be NZ Consul-General to Hong Kong, he brought her mother, Stella aged 15, and her younger brother. Their home was an apartment in a block called "Panorama" in the mid-levels of Hong Kong Island, with a splendid view: out across the bustling HK harbour, to Kowloon and the mists of the New Territories. International ships sailed through, Star Ferries went back and forth, junks and sampans plied their trade.

In 1967 the English Schools Foundation opened the new Island School. Stella entered the fourth form into the oldest cohort of students – no seniors. Those 30 students became a close-knit social group.

To ensure some family time, her parents bought a junk. The first time they pulled the sails up, they disintegrated. But Stella's father had made sure the junk had two outboard motors – to prevent headlines like: "NZ diplomat sparks international incident by drifting into the waters of Communist China." As an expat teenager, Stella had a lot of freedom. She explored Hong Kong on foot or by tram, discovering a place of great contrasts. But when after three years her father, mother and brother went to Western Samoa, Stella returned to Wellington, to start university – and reconnect with NZ. "I've had many adventures since Hong Kong – study, work, love, family and loss", Stella said.

In 2017 she returned to HK for the school's 50th celebration. A few of the old originals turned up – to find pollution where they used to swim, views blocked by apartment buildings, a smaller harbour due to land reclamation. But Stella was glad she went, to see old friends and Hong Kong as it is now. Then she was glad to return to our Wellington harbour, and the city that is her home.

# **Comings and Goings**

President Nick Lambrechtsen inducted Richard and Eleanor Bentley into our club at the April meeting. They were sponsored by David Hutton.

Although illness prevented Eleanor from attending the meeting, she was confirmed as a member 'in absentia', and we look forward to welcoming her soon.



Richard spent his early life in Khandallah, attending Khandallah School and Onslow College, and then studied engineering and economics at Canterbury University. Eleanor grew up on a farm in Five Rivers in Northern Southland, attended St Hilda's College in Dunedin and then graduated from the Christchurch School of Nursing.

They met in Christchurch in 1970 and married in England in 1972, living there for two and a half years with Eleanor working in industrial nursing and Richard in structural engineering. While there, they also travelled in the UK, Europe, Russia, and Israel.

Eleanor and Richard returned to NZ in 1974, settled in Khandallah, and met the Lambrechtsens and the Huttons. Then came 10 years in Auckland before returning to Wellington in 1990. They lived in Clark St for 20 years and both became heavily involved in the creation of the Karori Sanctuary.

Richard Bentley's career includes significant management and governance roles in many public, private, government and not for profit organisations. He is a Distinguished Fellow of the Institution of Professional Engineers and a Fellow of the Institute of Directors. He was awarded the CNZM in 2006. Richard and Eleanor have three children, six grandsons and live in a town house in Calcutta Street.

### **Theatre Review**

**Theatre outing to the Gryphon Theatre, 18<sup>th</sup> May 2023**. It is a truth universally acknowledged that a mother with five daughters in Regency England must be in want of their marital security, and fun. And so it was with Amy Whiterod and Joy Hellyer's revisionist comic adaptation of Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* for the stage and their own direction.

Fifteen Rebus members, as part of a full house, were delighted with their triumph. The cast of 21 were richly costumed in innumerable period ensembles and an army of nearly 40 off stage helpers ensured we admired their imaginative creativity. With Mr. Darcy played by Duncan MacIntyre, surely the handsomest young man in Wellington, and Elizabeth Bennet by Lydia Verschaffelt, an actress of established expressiveness, success was already secure. However, for this reviewer, the stars were the directors themselves. An impressively choreographed ball within the opening minutes, compelling skilled sword play and a speed dating scene elevated to farce were enthralling high moments, but without loss of Austen's resolute satire.

Yes, there were a few weak moments, as in all amateur productions, but only then can we see today a stage presentation of such large-scale inventiveness. The company calls itself Stagecraft and there was plenty of that.
