REPORTS

May 26 MEETING SPEAKER

Nick Lambrechtsen, on "The longest floating Bailey bridge of WWII."

We were curious about President Nick's link to the Netherlands and this very long Bailey bridge, and his talk was extremely interesting. Nick had travelled to the Netherlands in May 2022 to be present at the unveiling of two monuments (one on each side of the Maas river) to commemorate the building of the longest floating Bailey bridge of WWII: the Lambrechtsen Bridge, between Oeffelt and Gennep.

Nick was representing his father, Constant Lambrechtsen van Ritthem – a 'river engineer', a civil engineer with specialist knowledge of water level fluctuations of Dutch rivers. He had volunteered as a liaison officer in October 1944 to help the British Royal Engineers with all the rivers that the Army still had to cross, "The Opposed Crossing of a Water Obstacle", before they could invade Germany.

The Maas River at Gennep was already in flood at the end of January 1945, but was contained within its summer dykes. It was Lt Lambrechtsen's task to predict how wide the river was going to be a fortnight later (following winter snow melt and rain), after 10 February 1945, stipulated by Brigadier "Ginger" Campbell - the chief engineer for the 2nd Army in 1944. The timing was crucial – because that was when the British Army planned to invade Germany as part of Operation Veritable.

When Lt Lambrechtsen correctly forecast that the Maas was going to be 1.2 km wide, the Brigadier ordered 140 lorries of Bailey bridge material for constructing the bridge, designed by Lambrechtsen and Captain (later Major) Ted Hunt of the British Royal Engineers. This Bailey Pontoon Bridge, 1,222 metres long, the longest floating Bailey bridge built during WWII, was built in eight days, under

sniper fire, by 7th Army Troop Engineers. It was a Class 40 bridge (suitable for 40-ton loads, i.e. tanks). The bridge was open for use on the night of 19 February 1945. It was in use for several weeks and adjusted as the river level fell.

Major Hunt was still alive at the unveiling at 102 years of age, but he died just two months later, having seen his dream fulfilled in a spectacular way by the Dutch Army Engineers. Nick's father died in November 1994.

The inscription on the monument reads:

These two Bailey segments, floating above the banks of Oeffelt and Gennep, are a tribute to the floating Bailey Bridge, 1222 metres long and weighing 1126 tons, that the English sapper Major Edwin Hunt MVO and the Dutch civil engineer reserve lieutenant Constant Lambrechtsen van Ritthem planned and designed. The bridge was built between 12 and 20 February 1945 by 7th Army Troops Engineers of the British Second Army. With its staggering length, this masterpiece was the longest floating Bailey Bridge of WWII. "Have no fear, the sappers are here!"

SHORT TALK

David Littlejohn



David Littlejohn entertained us with a comprehensive glimpse through his life from childhood to meeting the English born girlfriend who became his wife, to marriage in England and almost three years of winter work in London interspersed with four summer months each year, minivan touring/exploring Europe — before returning to NZ in March 1983. And now we have to wait for Judith Littlejohn's short talk to find out what happened next!

David's parents had migrated from London in 1950, and probably found life very different in Upper Hutt, mainly in Heretaunga. David was born in 1954, three years after his brother, and in 1957 the family went to the UK to be introduced to all their relations. Aged three, David does not remember much about the journey by ship, except for the

dress-up party crossing the Equator when his brother went as Robin Hood and he was Maid Marion.

Primary school at Brentwood School was followed by Wellesley College at Day's Bay, which meant long days travelling, particularly when afternoon sport was added in. At Whanganui Collegiate as a boarder, sport was increasingly important, particularly rowing. Winning the Maadi Cup in 1971 was a highlight; as was leaving school with a bursary to attend university.

At Canterbury University, rowing took David to the university games at Massey University in 1973 – and rowing with Trevor Coker, a member of the successful 1972 Munich eight, in the University eights race. Canterbury won.

David returned to Wellington in 1976, and joined Shell Oil as an executive trainee – and that was where he met Judith, now his wife.

Since Judith wished to be married in England with her family, that was a great excuse for them both to leave Shell and travel. They left NZ in July 1980, explored parts of West and East Coast US on the way over – and after many family reunions and much enjoying of the London theatre scene – plays, musicals, ballets – plus exhaustive travels throughout the UK and continental Europe, they returned to NZ in 1983.

Peter Clemerson Theatre Review

Theatre visit to the Gryphon Theatre, 9th June 2023

In a full house of seventy people, ten leaving by or during the interval leaves a very noticeable hole. And so it was at the Gryphon Theatre when 19 members attended a performance of the Goodale brothers' award winning 2013 play *Jeeves and Wooster in Perfect Nonsense*, based upon P G Wodehouse's 1938 novel <u>The Code of the Woosters</u>. Given its successes in London, throughout the UK and then internationally, the choice of the play by the Repertory Company is understandable. However, its very success demands an exceptionally talented cast to meet the challenges of the fast-moving script and the multiple role changes it imposes upon three male actors. Alas, such talent was not to be seen at the Gryphon Theatre on the evening of the 9th June.

Tom Foy's excessive gesturing as Bertie Wooster had become tiresome within five minutes, when the first two of the ten left, and Ethan Lawn's Jeeves lacked the lofty disdain one expects of a supercilious valet. Nick Edwards tried hard in a multiplicity of roles although in none did he capture the audience. And instead of quick costume changes and rapid stage settings, we got pauses and pauses and more pauses, with Jeeves obliged to make impromptu remarks to fill them. It won't do, you know.

Visit to the Michael Fowler Centre, June 15


Peter Stupples, a retired Art History lecturer, gave 18 of us a talk and tour of the Gordon Crook banners and wall-hangings at the Michael Fowler Centre.

Textile artist Gordon Crook was commissioned by the Wellington City Council in 1982 to create the 12 banners and 10 wall hangings that add colour and softness to the concrete interior of the building. Nancye Seaton, herself a designer and maker of theatrical and ballet costumes, sewed all these art works.

The banners are 7m long by 1.5m wide, with colourful designs appliqued onto the linen background. The curved lower edges reflect the curved openings in the concrete columns of the concourse. The wall hangings, which hang between two floors, are 7m long by 5.5m wide and made of wool crepe. They are situated between the doors to the auditorium.

The vivid banners and wall-hangings all feature different bold, abstract designs. Jenny Cornelius

The head gardener then spoke to us about the restoration of the garden with plants specific to the time of the Beauchamp family residence.
